
## Titled Sketchbook Drawings - Volume Three - Abstractions -

Real sketchbook explorations. When the pen or pencil can wander freely into uncharted territories. I loved doing this frequently — when the pages become playgrounds with a *laissez-faire* approach of freedom. Sometimes elegance resulted, others obnoxious, twisted, surreal, and hopefully interesting at best. Several end up resembling something vaguely familiar. This lends to different types of titles. I've asked my online community to name these, and as the prize the winner receives the actual drawing framed.

Let's look at a collection of abstract drawings that were won...



"*Pensive Navigation*" - 1991 title from Floyd Flanagan

In pencil, being unique for me. It's a true abstract, not resembling much but lines, forms and shade. I like this title; it feels like navigating is occurring, and the nearly a pun use of the word *pensive* is like the word *pencil*. At least to me. Clever good!



"Musical Maelstrom" 1995 titled from Marc Weber

Another truly abstract. It feels like an energetic and complex source of sounds somehow. A symphony? A psychedelic jam? Cacophonous *musique concrete*? Take your pick. It's one of several that were influenced by my obsession with music.



"*Centrifugue*" 2012 title from Jon Alexandr

Cleverly named! With the musical fugue integrated rather than be a centrifuge, it's a made up word, perfect for the title!



"Conch Shell Beach Dream" 2004


title: Andrea Grenier-Geslain

Abstract yet resembling something. This name suggests a conch shell, but it isn't. This is where the dream in the title really works. If it's dream-based, it doesn't necessarily need to be a literal representation.



"*In Defiance Of The Rectilinear*" 2011 title from Bruce McKay

Done with a multicolored pencil — a Koh-i-noor Aristochrom 3400 - a favorite among my figure drawing cohorts, and this is far from figurative. The title tells of its chaos, constrained by its rectangular perimeters. If it really defied, would stretch beyond its edges. Still this restless energy appears to be pushing the walls of its boxed in prison. Yep, in defiance!



"Who Shall Seek The What" 2001 title from Gary Gustafson

Using a brush pen, in black ink, but with wider brush strokes that I would not get with a fine pointed fountain pen as my typically used tools. It's a dynamic motion-based drawing, pulsing with energy The abstract qualities make it open ended enough for this title, which doesn't make much sense, but I like it — so there.



"Jingo Wonderment Cements into Cassandra's Hairstyle" 2008 - Title from Richard Fong

A refined and odd drawing, that conjured a refined, odd title. Does this name reference anything of resemblance? I'll leave it at that ponderance.

The subjects do appear to be floating in space, leaning towards surrealism rather than 100% abstraction. Call it 50-50.



"Your Mind Is A Weird And Wonderful Place" - 1992

It's a flattering title if it's about the artist and still works when it's about the beholder. It's a weird and wonderful little sketchbook page? or maybe it's just weird? That's good enough for me.



"Louie Lights The Backflip Fantastic" 2000

title from Tracy Swedlow



That's the magic of the art - moments captured in a physical form.




*Mork!* - 2011 tited by Tara Evans

"What the hell is that?"


"it's Mork! "

"*Mechanical Whimsy in Bloom*" - 2005 title : Lisa B.



One of my musical abstractions, working out imagery for my then "out" jazz group The Haight Ashbury Free Band. (with notes surrounding in Nordic runes)


The title is a blast — circus like, and in a flagon? Give me a drink of that!

A name that made me laugh! Again I'm not sure why, and therein lies the appeal.


